ParentLine is still available to you at this time. ParentLine is a messaging service for parents and carers of children at schools in Southwark and Lambeth. Parents and carers can message a school nurse to get confidential advice about their child's health related issues.

Help via text message can be given about a range of issues including:

- emotional health and wellbeing
- keeping healthy
- bedwetting
- sleep
- bullying
- keeping safe
- growing up
- dental health
- support with medical conditions in school



The service is available Monday to Friday 9am to 5pm, year-round, including the school holidays (excluding bank holidays). Texts will be responded to within one working day (an automatic bounce-back will be sent if a message is received out of hours but someone will respond once the service opens). Please note: the ParentLine number is a text number only. It cannot receive phone calls.

## SOUTHWARK EMERGENCY SUPPORT SCHEME

Southwark Council announced earlier this week a further £1.5m in emergency funding to be made available ensuring those requiring emergency support including food and fuel would be able to access support immediately. Whilst the Government has announced some further support for families in receipt of free school meals, it may take some time to be made available.

The Local Authority are making temporary changes to the eligibility criteria for the Southwark Emergency Support Scheme.

Eligibility will be extended to those who experience a sudden loss or interruption to income as a consequence of the impacts of COVID-19 and who lack other resources to meet their household's basic needs for short periods.

The following criteria will also apply to families who live in Southwark and whose children are currently in receipt of free school meals until such times as government put alternative arrangements in place.

- Those claiming benefit but who face lengthy delays before they receive their first benefit payment and who lack other resources to meet urgent basic needs
- Those who are employed under zero-hour or similar contractual arrangements and who may still be employed but are without work or earnings and lack other resources to meet urgent basic needs
- Those who are self-employed but without work or income and lacking other resources to meet urgent basic needs
- Those whose income has fallen but where payment of Universal Credit for example does not yet reflect that change and who find themselves temporarily lacking resources to meet urgent basic needs
- Those facing significant deductions from their Universal Credit award or other benefits and as a consequence lack resources to meet urgent basic needs
- Those who experience problems claiming benefits for example due to difficulties in meeting evidence requirements (this would apply mainly to foreign nationals or UK citizens who were not born in the UK and who are we know likely to face problems when satisfying residency test for UC)

#### 10. [Twinkl](#)

Bit of a mixed blessing this one – most teachers couldn't live entirely without it, but if used poorly the worksheets can be more 'keep them busy' than teach them. It is enormous and covers every possible need and we use it for spelling activities (the children love the word searches). However, you probably need a printer to get the most out of it. Get the full package for free with the code CVDTWINKLHELPS

#### 9. [Phonics Play](#)

Possibly more appealing to KS1, this website also covers Phase 6 and spelling patterns which will be useful for those children still on a reading scheme and weaker spellers. Logon for free with the username: *march20* and the password: *home*

Learn all about the universe we live in by viewing these online videos.

#### 7. [National Theatre Home](#)

Shows available for free from the National Theatre. Live at 7pm each Thursday and then available on YouTube for a week. Who don't love a bit o' culture? If the content doesn't appeal to younger ones, you can watch [The Wind in the Willows](#) stage production online.

#### 6. [First News](#)

For a limited time, this newspaper, aimed at 7 – 14 year olds, are offering a free digital download of each week's edition.

#### 5. [Audible Stories](#)

Amazon's audiobook company have made their classic children's stories free on Audible for Kids. As far as we can tell, you would need to sign up for the free trial to get this offer, but might be worth investigating. It's worth noting too that Amazon Whispersync allows children to read a story on a Tablet/ Phone/ Kindle and listen to the audiobook at the same time. Great for children with dyslexic tendencies and those who struggle to finish longer novels.

#### 4. [BBC Bitesize](#)

Has been around for years and has the whole of the National Curriculum from Y1 to GCSE pretty much covered. Some of the games are a little less than educational but loads of great videos and something for everyone. They are also planning a full home school service from the 20<sup>th</sup> April.

### 3. [Tig Tag](#)

A resource we use for science in school with professional and informative videos. The site has ideas for activities too, some of which you may be able to do at home. The site also has quizzes for science and geography topics. Free to access at the moment and they even have sister sites: TigTag Jr for KS1 and Twig for KS3/4.

### 2. [Kahn Academy](#)

This site was set up specifically to offer distance learning and so it is one of the best adapted for current need. You can choose from a wide range of instructional videos for both Maths and Grammar and it comes with linked practice materials.

### 1. [Joe Wicks](#)

There's something special here. Not only do you get a great work-out that seems accessible for all ages and fitness levels to start your day, but a sense that he's bringing the country together at a time when we are isolated like never before. Get off your sofa and get moving!
