CURRICULUM SPECIAL: HISTORY

It has been a glittering couple of weeks for History at the Hamlet as we bring the past to life.

Last half term, Year 3 donned all manner of costume as they revelled in the glory of 'Ancient Greece' day, courtesy of Portals to the Past. Quizzes were had, facts were recalled, myths were told and battles were re-enacted, all to the delight of our pupils. Not to be outdone, Year 5 embarked on the grisly process of mummifying a chicken as part of their study of Ancient Egypt, following a highly informative, hands-on workshop at the Horniman Museum. Not only did they document each step of the procedure (for historical posterity, obviously), they also produced some very high-level source analysis as they developed their understanding of the Ancient Egyptian belief system. Such forms of active, immersive learning – 'doing' history, as it were - is key in supporting our core value of enjoyment, which is what we want our pupils to experience when engaging with history.





The History curriculum at Dulwich Hamlet fosters children's understanding and curiosity of the world in which they live and its rootedness in the past. By exploring connections, continuity and change across time and place, we aim to not only embed historical skills and knowledge in our children, but to provide context to their growing identities and social attitudes.

History is taught half termly, alternating with Geography, allowing the children to engage with a rich yet broad humanities curriculum.





Subject delivery

Unit designs follow four main thematic strands to ensure consistency across year groups as well as anchoring the means for children to expand their generative, disciplinary and substantive knowledge. These strands consist of:

- Influential events and figures
- Technology
- Daily life
- Locality

By organising learning in this way, the children are equipped to draw comparisons, contrasts and connections between different periods of and locations in history. For example, how daily life during the Stone Age (Year 3) is both similar and different to daily life in Anglo Saxon Britain (Year 4).

Vocabulary

Teaching History through vocabulary is crucial as it helps our pupils develop a deeper understanding of historical concepts, events and contexts and how they interrelate. It encourages the development of skills such as comparing and contrasting, identifying bias, making inferences and evaluating evidence; these skills are essential for pupils to think like historians and engage in historical analysis. Furthermore, by equipping our children with precise vocabulary and terminology, they are able to articulate and build on their basic understanding of political systems, social structures, economic factors and cultural aspects of different time periods.

A typical lesson

History lessons at the Hamlet are varied and interesting for pupils and allow flexibility and creativity for teachers.

Lessons will often start with a short quiz to assess and activate recall, an 'odd one out' or image starter to encourage discussion and thinking. Children will then be introduced to a key concept through vocabulary. Specific historical content will be communicated either explicitly or through exploration, depending on the task. Most lessons will focus on a paired or group-based activity – concrete wherever possible – to contextualise the knowledge. Such activities may involve sorting events to create a timeline, examining sources, story-telling, drama or creative reimagining through design. Not only do these structured activities afford the children crucial opportunities to develop their team-working skills, it also allows them to share and gain knowledge from one another.

Most lessons will then move to an independent activity where children are then encouraged to think more deeply about what they've learnt as well as the skills they've employed by writing a short piece in their book. This may be a reflection, a comparison-based paragraph, an analysis or summary. This is an important means of self-expression and a way for them to consolidate and demonstrate their learning.



Looking ahead

Underlying the glitter of course, is robust pedagogy and I'm thrilled that History will be the next subject to take part in our pupil book study. This will allow us to explore what our children really know about History at the Hamlet, how this manifests in their written learning and how well this knowledge is built upon as they progress through Key Stage.

I look forward to the challenges ahead and how we can make the experience of history for our children all the more enriching.
