Please help your child to learn the government words, perhaps by having a 'word of the day' or by playing games and puzzles. A little every day is much more effective than a long session once a week! As well as being able to spell these words, the children should also know what they mean and how to use them in spoken and written English. Writing these words in sentences is more valuable than writing them in isolation and will help your child apply them in their own writing.
